Hensley*, 556 U.S. 838 (2009).
- Successfully moved for new trial following multimillion-dollar adverse jury verdict in deceased former employee's lawsuit alleging lung cancer caused by occupational exposure to radiation, diesel exhaust fumes, and asbestos; during retrial, successfully moved to exclude expert opinion testimony

of estate's radiation physicist, toxicologist, industrial hygienist, and treating physician, and thereafter obtained summary judgment; *rev'd on appeal by* 467 S.W.3d 413 (2015).
